Information from the organizers of the 5th Meeting of Young Researchers in Contemporary History

1. According to the spirit behind this meeting, we want to remind that from the very beginning we are thinking about **avoiding old-fashioned model of narrating each of the papers** presented at the workshops. On the contrary, we have stood up for identifying controversial, useful or revealing keypoints for our research derived from the work of our colleagues.

Thus, we propose a model for the workshops based on promoting debate instead of narration.

So on the 14th and 15th, in each sessions, you will have **10-12 minutes each to present** the key points of your paper and research to let more than **1 hour in each session for discussions**, debates and constructive critiques. This discussion will probably starts between the participants of each sessions (due do proximity in topics) but everybody will be involved at each time.

As chair panellists, we will chair all the sessions, with the participation of a special guest: Anaïs Bohuon, young lecturer at the University of Paris-Sud Orsay (FRA), historian and sociologist specialized in gender and political issues.

On the afternoon of the 15th, the official session wants to open some broad discussions and wants to identify landmarks in the history of the "Cold War".

- 2. By the way, to facilitate all the discussions and exchange, we may ask you two things until the conference:
- for July the 1st we ask you to prepare **a one to two page(s) document in English**, which present the main conclusions and arguments of your paper (if your paper is not in already in English and if you didn't already send this document).
- for the conference itself, if we do not want to simply stay in a kind of mainstream and even if there are only few English native speaker, we do think that using English for presentation might be the better way to engage discussions on the simplest basis. Of course, in the discussions all the possibility of speaking together will remain open, depending on the skills of each of us.

We will provide a computer and a beamer at the Olympic Museum's sessions.

3. At the occasion of this conference, we want to set up a new network focused on the history of sporting international relations. Regarding this project: original way of thinking, aims, next meetings, name, administrative team will have to be defined together in July, especially during the "founding assembly" which will be held on the 14th in the evening, during the first moment of our common diner (place to be confirmed).

The organization of the four sessions from the 14th and 15th of July is only based on the work of the upcoming association, that we have to build together. So the organizers of those two days are only us, and we are doing our best to offer you the best conditions to work at the Olympic Museum.
